15	WHEREAS:	
16	A. The Naabik'iyati' Committee, established by the Navajo Nation Council as a standing	
17	committee under 2 N.N.C. §§ 700 (A), 701 (A) (6), is empowered to coordinate and	
18	facilitate communication regarding proposed county, state, and federal legislation	
19	impacting the Navajo Nation.	
20	B. The Navajo Nation recognizes that their police department, like other Tribal police	
21	departments, are facing sever personnel shortages, impacting their ability to effectively	
22	provide law enforcement services over an extensive geological area.	
23	C. House Bill 4524 ("H.R. 4524") titled: "Parity for Tribal Law Enforcement Act" - if	
24	passed will treat certain tribal law enforcement officers as federal law enforcement	
25	officers under specified circumstances. Exhibit A.	
26	D. Specifically, the Parity for Tribal Law Enforcement Act would authorize law	
27	enforcement officers of Indian tribes that contract or compact any or all federal law	
28	enforcement functions through the Indian Self-Determination and Education	
29	Assistance Act to enforce federal law within the tribe's jurisdiction if those officers

- meet certain qualifications. These qualifications include completing training and passing an adjudicated background investigation. **Exhibit B**.
- E. The Parity for Tribal Law Enforcement Act would deem a tribal law enforcement officer who is acting under an authorized contract or compact as a federal law enforcement officer for the purposes of certain federal laws, including for injury and death, retirement, and pension benefits. Exhibit B.
- F. The Navajo Nation recognizes the Parity for Tribal Law Enforcement Act would benefit the Navajo Nation and all of Indian Country by enhancing our ability to recruit and retain Tribal law enforcement officers through increased benefits. **Exhibit C**.
- G. The Navajo Nation acknowledges that our Navajo people are disproportionately affected by the lack of law enforcement funding and resources available, like all American Indian and Alaska Natives.
- H. For the reasons stated above, it is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation to supports the Parity for Tribal Law Enforcement Act, H.R. 4524, to enhance our ability to protect and police our lands and keep all Dine safe by increasing parity for Tribal law enforcement.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- A. The Navajo Nation urges Congress to pass H.R. 4524 Parity for Tribal Law Enforcement Act.
- B. The Navajo Nation further urges Congress to appropriate funding so that Tribes may fully take advantage of the amendments in H.R. 4524, without taking funding away from other Tribal programs.
- C. The Navajo Nation hereby authorizes the Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council, the President of the Navajo Nation, and their designees, to advocate for the adoption of the Parity for Tribal Law Enforcement Act.
