TITLE OF RESOLUTION: AN ACTION RELATING TO NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE; SUPPORTING A "PETITION FOR TEMPORARY WAIVER" REQUESTING AN INCREASE OF THE FEDERAL COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION MONTHLY LIFELINE SUPPORT FOR TRIBAL NATIONS, INCLUDING THE NAVAJO NATION, TO ENSURE AFFORDABILITY OF BROADBAND SERVICES

PURPOSE: This resolution, if approved, supports the "Petition of Temporary Waiver" requesting an increase to the FCC monthly Lifeline Support for Tribal Nations, including the Navajo Nation, to ensure continued affordability of broadband services.

Final Authority: Naabik'iyati Committee

Vote Required: Simple Majority

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committee. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each committee member to review the proposed resolution in detail.

D. The Infrastructure Act provided \$14.2 billion dollars to modify and extend the

Emergency Broadband Benefit Program into a longer-term broadband affordability

program called the Affordable Connectivity Program ("ACP"), a United States

- government-sponsored program providing subsidies for wireless Internet to low-income households.
- E. Eligibility for the ACP subsidy requires that household income to be at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines. Households receiving a Tribal Lifeline subsidy for phone services with a local provider automatically qualify for ACP.
- F. The Navajo Naabik'iyati' Committee passed resolution NABIJA-02-24, supporting the extension of the Affordable Connectivity Program by the U.S. Congress. **Exhibit 1**.
- G. NABIJA-02-24 highlighted the following:
 - During the past three years of the COVID pandemic, more than 40,000 Navajo
 Tribal members and their families utilized the ACP program for free Internet
 service. Today many Navajo families have come to heavily rely on their ACP
 benefits for Internet access.
 - 2. Navajo students K-12 and those in college depend on the Internet made possible through ACP to attend school remotely.
 - 3. Through telehealth services, Navajo members in remote regions have access to healthcare resources made available through Internet connectivity.
 - 4. Affordable Internet access provides Navajo families opportunities to work remotely, which would not otherwise be feasible without reliable Internet access.
- H. A "Petition for Temporary Waiver" date April 5, 2024, was filed with the Federal Communications Commission ("FCC"), requesting a temporary increase to the amount of the monthly Tribal Lifeline benefit. The requested increase from \$25.00 to \$65.75, would match what was previously available through ACP for broadband services and cover access charges so essential broadband services could continue until a permanent solution is provided. Exhibit 2.
- I. The Petition, filed by Smith Bagley, Inc. dba Cellular One, is a regional carrier that has provided service to the Navajo Nation an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier ("ETC") since 2000. Cellular One provides subsidized Trible Lifeline mobile phone service across the Navajo Nation.
- J. The FCC could quickly resolve the present need for continued access to affordable broadband for Tribes with a temporary increase to Tribal Lifeline benefit, granting ETCs

- on Tribal lands the ability to provide vital broadband service immediately without further Congressional action.
- K. On April 25, 2024, Navajo Nation President Buu Nygren submitted a letter of support of the temporary increase to the Federal Communications Commission Chairwoman, Jessica Rosenworcel, to continue to keep broadband affordable for Tribal households, especially for those located in remote areas who are among the most in need of these services. Exhibit 3.
- L. The Navajo Nation Council acknowledges the significance of ensuring digital equity for Navajo families and urges the Federal Communications Commission to grant the waiver request and provide a temporary increase to the Tribal Lifeline subsidy, to ensure that access and availability of broadband services to all Navajo members, as well as other Tribal Communities, continues undisturbed.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- A. The Navajo Nation Council supports the Smith Bagley, Inc. Petition for Temporary Waiver and urges the Federal Communications Commission to swiftly grant the waiver to temporarily increase the Tribal Lifeline Benefit.
- B. The Navajo Nation Council hereby authorizes the Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council, the President of the Navajo Nation, and their designees, to advocate for broadband Internet funding to the FCC, U.S. Congress and appropriate federal agencies. This advocacy aims to ensure that all Navajo families enjoy equal access to broadband Internet services, aligning with the equitable standards provided to all other Americans.
